

The Story of the 1966 Chevrolet ElectroVair

The story of the ElectroVair began in 1964 when GM built the first Corvair fitted with an electric motor and a battery pack instead of a flat-six engine. There's not a lot of info on this prototype based on the first-gen Corvair, but Chevrolet revisited the idea in 1966. By that time, it had introduced the secondgen compact with a new suspension design to correct the "notorious" handling problems of the first Corvair. Apparently, GM picked the Corvair for its electrification project for two reasons. First, it was the lightest car in its corporate lineup at around 2,500 pounds (1,134 kg). Second, the Corvair was a rear engine car, making it the perfect candidate to receive an induction motor in the rear and a battery pack in the rather spacious front trunk.

But Chevrolet also had loads of Corvairs sitting around as sales plummeted following the publication of Ralph Nader's book, "Unsafe at Any Speed," in 1965. The ElectroVair II, based on a 1966 Monza four-door hardtop model, looked identical to a regular Corvair inside and out. But the 2.7-liter flat-six mill was no longer filling up the space atop the rear axle, having been swapped out for an AC induction motor. The unit was good for 115 horsepower

For reference, the gas-powered 1966 Corvair delivered 95 horses in the base spec and 140 horsepower in rangetopping trim. The motor got its juice from a 532-voltsilver-oxide battery pack mounted un- der the front hood, which acted as a trunk on the regular Corvair. The con-version added almost 1,000 pounds (454 kg) to the car's curb weight, which made the Corvair as heavy as a full -size Chevrolet Impala. But that's still lighter than a modern Tesla Model S, which tips the scales at more than 4,300 pounds (1,950 kg). GM claimed that the electrified Corvair needed around 16 seconds to hit 60 mph (97 kph) from a standing start. It seems painfully slow at first glance, but the EV was actually on par with the base Corvair. It was, however, some four seconds slower than the 140-horsepower sedan. The drivetrain topped out at 80 mph(129 kph), notably slower than the regular production Corvair, good for93 to 108 mph (150 to 174 kph) de- pending on engine specs.

Range, on the other hand, was very limited since batteries were far from compact at the time and the Corvair's trunk had its space limitations. GM advertised the Electrovair's range at 40 to 80 miles (64 to 129 km) on a full charge. But the almost unusable range wasn't the concept car's only problem. The high-density silver-oxide batteries were not only expensive and still heavy at the time, but they also wore out after being recharged only 100 times. So they had to be replace the ElectroVair covered 4,000 to 8,000 miles (6,437 to 12,875 km), a little more than a trip from New York to Los Angeles and back.

But GM never planned to turn the electrified Corvair into a production model, so the company was happy with the attention it got from showcasing the EV to astonished journalists. While some viewed the ElectroVair as a preview of things to come, little did they know that the electric car was still a few good decades away.

As the early 1970s brought the first regulations for fuel economy and

emissions, automakers began focusing on new technologies for gasoline engines. GM's next venture into electric cars would only come in the late 1980s when the development of the iconic EVI began. Chevrolet also built an electric concept based on the Chevrette hatchback in 1978. It was named the Electro vette and was capable of traveling up to 50 miles at 30 mph (80 km at 48 kph), and had a top speed of 53 mph (85 kph).

Finished in light metallic blue, the ElectroVair II has been kept and maintained to this day and it can be viewed on display inside GM's Renaissance Center in Detroit.



Stock Corvair Group

The Stock Corvair Group (SCG) website, <u>http://stock.corvair.org</u>, is the home base of operations for the Stock Corvair Group. Kent Sullivan and I have spent the past couple of months updating the site, adding new material, editing, and tagging the old material, and giving the site a new, fresh look. We invite you to visit it and check out some of our new features:

- All material, including photos, is now tagged, making it easier to find topics of interest to you. Just go to the home page and select one of the tags and the site will show you all posts with that tag.
- New content includes original research on Washer Bottle Brackets, many new external sites added, including links to all original Dealer Sales brochures, detailed help on finding and understanding date codes, Trull's "Corvair Gold".
- There is now a Help section on the menu bar, which includes information on how to use the site to post, add media, manage subscriptions, etc.
- There is a new section devoted to surveys and research questions. This includes some new surveys, including a member survey where you can tell us more about your interests and offer suggestions for improving the site.
- Photos of all cars inspected at any "Annual Stock Corvair Event" are now available for review. Each ASCE now has its own page with links to the entire album or to individual cars. We even have documentation of some "new" survivor cars over these past two pandemic years!
- We have released more material to the public area of the website. That said, you still need to login to see all of the content.

I'm saving our most exciting news for last! We have tried for several years to evaluate Stock Corvairs at CORSA conventions (ASCE). We have not had great success with that approach, for a variety of reasons. So now we are going to offer members the opportunity to participate in "Virtual" Stock Assessments. The way it will work is this: interested parties will

complete an interactive form we have prepared which will give us a lot of useful information, and then they will submit a series of photos that we will review to complete the evaluation. This is an exciting opportunity to better document and preserve the information in an ever-diminishing number of survivor cars, or to help those who are trying to restore their cars to factory appearance. If you are interested in this project, open and complete the "SCG Stock Evaluation Request Form", found in the "Surveys" section of the website.

Also, we will continue to offer the Facebook SCG Page and Group for our more social-media minded members. The Facebook Stock Corvair Group at https://www.facebook.com/groups/709344113297765 has been very popular, currently with 1,070 members. This is certainly the place to



Al Lacki's Engine Cradle Design

DESIGN BASIS: This engine cart is designed for usage with Craftsman aluminum ATV jack. It should be possible to use this design with other ATV jacks, too.

ENGINE SHROUDS: YES or NO? This engine cart is designed for removing and installing Corvair engines that have the lower shrouds installed. The shrouds support the weight of the engine without any problem. If your Corvair engine has no lower shrouds, then replace the 2x6 Upper Runners with 2x4s. Be sure to space the 2x4 upper runners so that the shroud mounting lugs, (which extend outward from the crankcase on each side of the oil pan), fully rest on the tops of 2x4runners. I have built and used another copy of this engine cart for an engine with headers, using 2x4s for the upper runners, and it works fine.

MAIN BEAMS: Main beams are constructed of 2x6 Douglas fir. Lengthwise runners are 33 inches long. Cross members are 30.5 inches long. It may be possible to construct this cart

with white pine, but Douglas fir is significantly stronger. All wood and hardware purchased at Home Depot. The friendly folks at Home Depot sawed most of the wood pieces to length for me, saving me lots of time fussing with my Skill saw.

JACK RAIL GUIDES: The runners on the ATV jack slip between 1x2 wooden guide rails on the bottom of the cart to ensure the load is centered, left-to-right. These jack rail guides are made of cheap 1x2 white pine. They bear no load.

FASTENERS: Screwed together with self-piloting SPAX wood screws. SPAX makes a wide variety of screws. I used their #9X 2.5 inch T-Starheaded multi-material construction screws. No pre-drilling is required. After you try them, you'll never go back to conventional Phillips-head screws.

CASTER WHEELS: Casters are 5 inch diameter, enabling the ATV jack to be pulled out from underneath the cart when the cart is lowered to the ground. The casters are positioned outboard so that the ATV jack can be pulled out from beneath the cart once it's lowered to the ground. Those little casters on the rear of the jack have a narrow track, but the casters on the front of the jack have a much wider track; I spaced the big casters on the cast on the cast on the front of the jack.

COST OF MATERIALS: The cost of materials for the cart is nearly \$80. The wood is cheap. The money is in the casters, bolts, nuts, and washers. You really don't need the casters, but they make it so easy to roll the assembly around, once it's lowered


down to the floor. I should also mention that I used four swivel casters instead of just two, which makes it even easier to roll it around with the powertrain on top. At night, I'd simply roll the whole thing behind my Corvair in the garage, freeing up the other garage bays for my other cars to park.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR USE: The engine cart should be positioned under the power train so that the bolt lugs on the bell housing rest on the front cross-member of the cart. This position provides a good balance (center of gravity) with and without the transaxle attached to the engine.

Corvair **Cooks** Corner Corned Beef and Cabbage

Recipe by: Alton Brown, Food Network (Received 5-Star Review)

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 2 1/2 pound Corned-Beef Brisket*, (recipe follows)
- tablespoon coarsely ground black pepper teaspoon ground allspice
- 2 bay leaves
- 2 teaspoons kosher salt
- 1/2 pound diced carrots, approximately 4 small
- 1/2 pound diced onions, approximately 2 small
 pound potatoes, peeled and chopped, approximately 3 medium
- 1/4 pound diced celery, approximately 2 stalks
 small head cabbage, chopped, approximately 2 pounds

Corned Beef:

- 2 quarts water
- l cup kosher salt
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons saltpeter
- I cinnamon stick, broken into several piecesI teaspoon mustard seeds
- I teaspoon black peppercorns
- 8 whole cloves
- 8 whole allspice berries
- 12 whole juniper berries
- 2 bay leaves, crumbled
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 2 pounds ice
- I (4 to 5 pound) beef brisket, trimmedsmall onion, quartered
- l large carrot, coarsely chopped
- stalk celery, coarsely chopped

DIRECTIONS:

1. Place the corned beef, pepper, allspice, bay leaves and salt into a large 8-quart pot along with 3-quarts of water. Cover and set over high heat. Bring to a boil, decrease the heat to low and cook, at a low simmer for 2 1/2 hours.

After 2 1/2 hours add the carrots, onions, potatoes and celery. Return to a simmer and cook uncovered for 15 minutes. After 15 minutes, add the cabbage and cook for an additional 15 to 20 minutes until the potatoes and cabbage are tender. Remove the bay leaves and serve immediately.

Corned Beef:

- Place the water into a large 6 to 8 quart stockpot along with salt, sugar, saltpeter, cinnamon stick, mustard seeds, peppercorns, cloves, allspice, juniper berries, bay leaves and ginger. Cook over high heat until the salt and sugar have dissolved. Remove from the heat and add the ice. Stir until the ice has melted. If necessary, place the brine into the refrigerator until it reaches a temperature of 45 degrees F. Once it has cooled, place the brisket in a 2-gallon zip top bag and add the brine. Seal and lay flat inside a container, cover and place in the refrigerator for 10 days. Check daily to make sure the beef is completely submerged and stir the brine.
- 2. After 10 days, remove from the brine and rinse well under cool water. Place the brisket into a pot just large enough to hold the meat, add the onion, carrot and celery and cover with water by 1-inch. Set over high heat and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat to low, cover and gently simmer for 2 1/2 to 3 hours or until the meat is fork tender. Remove from the pot and thinly slice across the grain.

Cook's Note:

*Brisket should be prepared

through the brining stage, but not cooked.
