Email Response: Joe,

I'm kind of ashamed. I am a (long time) Vietnam magazine subscriber, and I saw the Nader reference, I should have made note and sent it along to you; I have since passed along that issue to another Vietnam vet, I do not ask to get the issues back. You are correct, Jane Fonda is reviled by Vietnam vets, myself included, for her anti-war posture, and her "consorting" with the North Vietnamese by making a visit there in 1972, though there is substantial exaggeration of what she said and did while there; nevertheless, her actions were very demoralizing, I have no desire to ever see her.

For those copied who are not aware, my "Vietnam / Corvair" connection is that my first car, a '65 Corsa turbo coupe, Artesian Turquoise over white (new to me, August, 1966), remained in my Mom and Dad's garage, seeing almost no use during my 131/2 month tour (the current day "deployment" term was not in vogue back then) -- as Joe, Dave and Gary know, my Dad would include audio of the running and revved up motor, along with the sweet sound of a toilet flushing, in his and Mom's reel-to -reel audio tapes they sent to me, I was not as good at sending tapes back to them. You would be surprised how much of an inspiration it was to me, knowing my Corsa was back home, waiting for my return.

Also, I recall seeing one 'Vair when in Vietnam, a late model 500 sedan, I think a '66 or '67, while at Tan Son Nhut AFB outside Saigon for a couple of days, I believe the 500 was assigned to a "Field Grade" (Major, LTC or Colonel) USAF



If you are looking for one of the fastest SCCA vintage race cars in the country, this is the one. Price \$13,900. The car is built from a 1967 Monza and the original chassis was in above average condition. It has a full cage from end to end-- bars extending to frame members in trunk and engine compartment. Fuel cell mounted in the front trunk area--- 10 or 12 gallons. Front and rear carbon fiber deck lids, pin mounted. Carbon-kevlar drivers seat -- 8 lb including mounting rails. 15 x 7 aluminum Real Wheels brand wheels. Five wheels included. Weight last time it was scaled was 2007 lb total. Fiberglass cross-member for mounting front of drive train. 3.55 posi diff with a double close ratio trans and a lightweight puck type clutch disc. Car also has 4 wheel Wildwood 4 piston caliper disc brakes dialed in with brake proportioning valve in car. This is a full out track car with all the top notch gear. 

Collector's Love for Corvairs still strong, even though some have Hit the Road

Pete Koehler loves Corvairs – 1960 models, specifically. In fact, his passion for them is so intense that his recent decision to pare down his collection may have been a bit of a surprise to some.

Not to worry, Koehler insists. The sky isn't falling. He simply can't get around like he used to. "It's just a lack of mobility," said the long-time member of the Detroit Area Corvair Club. "It isn't life threatening, just fun threatening."

Koehler's solution was to let some of the cars go. He listed 11 Corvairs on Craigslist last month, and then not-so-secretly hoped they didn't sell. Four of them did, and a couple may be on the verge.

"I thought I'd try to sell a few, and I put decent prices on them," said Koehler, 63. "I figured, if they sell, they sell. If they don't, they don't. I would have been happy if none of them sold ... and I would have been pretty sad if they all had."

During a 38-year career at General Motors – half as a field rep and the other half as an engineer – Koehler gained a deep appreciation for GM automobiles. But he said he caught the Corvair bug long before that.

"I bought my first Corvair in '68 when I was a teenager. I thought, 'Wow, a 4-door sedan with bucket seats for only 10 bucks? What a deal.' It didn't have an engine, but what did I know?" Koehler said with a laugh. "I tried to get it fixed up, and I was appalled by how much money they wanted to charge me, so I started working on it myself. That's where it all started. Eventually it just went crazy."

Koehler, who retired from GM in 2008, was nicknamed "Caveman" by a friend

because of his love for the '60s, and that is evident in his collection. Among the cars that he didn't offer for sale are a 1964 Greenbrier Sportwagon and five Corvair convertibles – a 1962, a '65, two '66s and a '69, the last that Chevrolet built. The '69 is on display at the Chevrolet Hall of Fame Museum in Decatur, Ill.

One of the 1960 models that didn't sell is a Jade Green and White 500 sedan with manual 3-speed transmission. It is the oldest surviving Canadian-built Corvair, and Koehler is hoping to work out a longterm loan agreement to display it at the Canadian Automotive Museum in Oshawa, Ontario.

Another with an uncertain future is a 1960 "Holden" replica that pays homage to early prototypes that were painted flat black and given Australian Holden badges to throw off the competition. Several suitors have expressed an interest in the car.

Among the Corvairs finding new homes was a 1960 custom job nicknamed "Stubby" that was shortened by 18 inches and converted to a 2-door. It was featured at last summer's Michigan Concours d'Lemons, a tongue-in-cheek alternative to the Concours d'Elegance of America.

"Before I started letting some them go, I had 20 Corvairs," Koehler said, then stopped to consider Stubby. "Well, maybe it's more like 19 1/2. Either way, that's far too many for one human being.

"My brother and I used to go to the Carlisle (Pa.) show every year, and we'd see guys selling the same cars year after year after year. They'd promised their wives they would try to sell, but they



always put a number on the car that no one would pay so they could bring it back home."

Koehler didn't pull those shenanigans with his wife, Patty. He promised – and actually parted with some. Of course, this isn't the first time that he's sold a Corvair or two or three or four ...

"It's tough to prove, but I've owned over a thousand Corvairs in my lifetime," Koehler said. "I own them, work on them, sell them and buy more. It's become a little joke around here. We call them 'Corvairs Formerly Owned By Pete' – and there are a lot of them."

Koehler thinks he may have turned over a new leaf, however.

"Do I miss the cars that I've sold? Sure," he said. "Will I build the collection up again? Geez, I hope not."


PRESIDENTS MESSAGE



How to Take Dents out of Stainless Steel Trim

First, thing to do is to never overlook the condition of the stainless steel trim. It is generally used to finish off the side and back glass and windshield, and can turn dull over the years. It is normal to see trim that has been dented or bent. Heavier and shinier than anodized aluminum, thinner and more durable than pot metal, stainless steel is the only trim you can restore yourself with very little expense. It is advised to practice your techniques on a piece of scrap trim first. Remember, no two dents are the same so you may need to vary your technique to meet the challenge.

1. Remove the trim from the car and lightly spray ink or use a felt tip marker on the area that is dented. Take a fine "mill bastard" file, which can be purchased at any hardware store, and gently scrape it across the marked area. This removes the ink from the level spots, fully revealing the dent(s). It is important to use a very fine file so you don't gouge the surface.

2. Place trim on a good working surface made of plywood. Turn the trim over and locate the dents on the reverse side. Using a punch, gently push on each dent in several spots. This is one of those times you must have patience. Take your time and don't apply a lot of pressure. Constantly examine your progress by rescraping the surface on the other side with the file. Eventually, the dented area will be flush with the rest of the trim surface. Spend time looking over trim for other smaller dents that may become visible once you have removed the larger dents. (Photo 1)

3. Even the surface of trim with your file (Photo 2). Make sure to reverse the direction every few strokes to a cross-hatch pattern. If you continue to file in one direction, it will create deeper gouges that will be more difficult to remove later on. It is critical that the file doesn't clog with metal shavings as this can gall the stainless steel.

4. Take a break because you will need patience on this next stage. Using a water-soaked 220-grit sandpaper, remove the scratches left by the file. This will take a lot of time and wet sandpaper (Photo 3). After you have cut through all the file marks, use wet 400-grit sandpaper to take out the scratches left behind by the 220-grit paper.

5. Final polishing requires the use of a polishing/buffer wheel (Photo 4). Some people may not have one so at this point you may want to take your trim to a professional restorer or experienced bodyman for this last step.

If you decide to do it yourself, it is very important that you keep a firm grip on the piece you are buffing and completely concentrate on your work. A buffing wheel turns at several thousand rpms. A piece of metal can easily be ripped out of your hands and result in a serious injury for you or another spectator.

If you want to do this yourself, start with the cutting wheel and use a rough compound to take out the 400-grit sandpaper scratches. Next, you will want to use the flannel buffing wheel with white rouge compound until shiny.

Rub down the part with a soft cloth and then take a few moments to look at your recreated trim (Photo 5)!
